Understanding how the COVID-19 pandemic impacted work-integrated learning employers and community partners in BC


Executive summary


Between September 2020 and May 2021, the BC WIL Council conducted research to better understand the evolving impacts of COVID-19 with employers and community partners who typically hire students through work-integrated learning (WIL) programs. Overall, survey respondents were confident that the outlook for WIL is positive, with hiring in some industries, regions and types of WIL expected to surpass pre-COVID-19 hiring levels. The results highlight the ways workplaces have mitigated the impacts of the pandemic and the supports they need, which will inform WIL program planning for 2021-2022.






Outlook for WIL is positive




90% of survey respondents agree that the outlook for WIL engagements in their organization is promising.



Demand for WIL types varies

Expected WIL hiring for the next 6 to 12 months, compared to usual WIL hiring, by WIL type
(where 100% means no change in WIL hiring compared to pre-pandemic levels)



Overall, survey respondents expect to be at 98% of their usual WIL engagements within the next 6 to 12 months.




Difficulty supervising students remotely

Work approaches during and post-pandemic


